Charming Village Nakagusuku

Nakagusuku village is known for its rich land and scenic landscape.
Lord Gosamaru and Nakagusuku Castle highlight Ryukyu history during the Ko(ancient) Ryukyu period, and such events are sung in Ryuka; a fixed form poetry of the Ryukyu Islands.







⊙The Main Gate

It is said to have been a wooden turret above the gate. The stone wall protrudes from both sides of the gate to allow defense from three directions; the front and the either side.





⊙The South Enclosure

The most sacred place in the castle. There are prayer grounds for Shuri worship, Kudaka worship and also to pray for rain.









Nakagusuku Castle and Gosamaru

In the second half of the 14th century,

Sakinakagusuku Aji constructed four enclosures: the first, Second, South and West enclosures. Construction took place over several generations.

Around 1440, the Nakagusuku Aji Gosamaru, who had been relocated from Zakimi Castle in Yomitan, added the North and Third enclosures, completing construction of this castle with six beautiful enclosures. In August 15th 1458 of the Chinese calendar month, Katsuren Aji, the Lord Amawari, led a raid with the king's army, suspecting Gosamaru of treason.

Lord Gosamaru committed suicide, without attempting to fight.

The Second Enclosure

The enclosure with a beautiful curvilinear shape has a prayer ground and a memorial for the war dead of the Russo-Japanese war.





This remain land enclosure

This narrow long enclosure was the perfect place for archery training and horsemanship. There are also three prayer grounds in the enclosure.






Nakamorino-oibe is a guardian deity of Nakagusuku castle.

⊙The Third Enclosure

Lord Gosamaru added this enclosure. The stone architecture was the most advanced at the time of Gusuku era (12~15th century) with its characteristic steep stairs.

The North Enclosure

Believed to have been constructed by Lord Gosamaru in order to surround the well. The excavation revealed highly skilled drainage work.





⊙The Rear Gate

The largest and oldest arched gate in Okinawa. After 550 years, the gate keeps its dignified form to this day, proving the remarkable skill of the time.







This is one of the oldest turtleback tombs existing in Okinawa, and Lord Gosamaru of Nakagusuku Castle rests in the tomb.






6. Ai-chan Shokudo

Whetting the great green turban shell down to a fine 0.07 of a millimeter and laying that individually onto lacquer-ware requires a highly skilled technique and knowledge.

Speciality

Shima ninfin (Carrot)

Shima ninjin, rich in carotene, has been used for a wide variety of dishes; soup, stir fry and even medicinal cuisine. The best season for Shima ninjin is winter.



Shima-daikon-(White-radish)

Round juicy Shima daikon is often used in cooking with meat and kelp. Great for stewing and simmering, as it does not fall apart easily after hours of cooking.



Hanta Michi

Path of History

Path of History "Hanta Michi" (Hanta Road) was constructed during the Gusuku era (between 12th and 15th century). This old thoroughfare stretches from Shuri to Katsuren, going through Kouchi Castle in Nishihara Town and Nakagusuku Castle in Nakagusuku Village. Many cultural properties remain along this road.





@161.8 Kouchi Jinchi

(High-ground position)

Atop of the rocky mountain at an elevation of 160m in Kitauebaru area, the Japanese army built a high-ground position, known as 161.8 Kouchi Jinchi. A panoramic view, north to south, from Chatan town and Yomitan village to the Chinen peninsula is available from this location.

⊗ Kishimakono-taki

Okuma settlement began at the top of the mountain and people in the settlement still pray at this prayer ground today.





3 The Arakaki Stone Bridge

This arched stone bridge is located over the stream near the fields of the Arakaki settlement. Similar types of stone bridges existed until just after the Second World War, however now there is only one remaining.





@ Prefectural Road

Construction Monument

This monument was built in commemoration of the opening of the Futenma-Yonabaru route (currently Route 35) in October 1934.

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5 Tunmaasu

A pine tree is encircled by a low stonewall. Arakaki gusuku and Nakagusuku castle are to the east and Ginowan city is to the west.



6 Arakaki Gusuku

The year for the construction of this castle is unknown, however, it is estimated to be early 14th century from the excavated relic.

Utaki (Sacred prayer ground for god of Ryukyu mythology) and shrine are seen inside the castle. These places are considered to be highly significant for the Arakaki settlement.







@Uchibara-no-tun

Hall of worship in Arakaki gusuku where people pray for health, longevity and to give thanks for good harvests.



Perry's Banner Rock

It is said that Commodore Perry and his expedition team placed the American flag on top of this rock with a gun salute to commemorate their conquest during their expedition of Okinawa.



❸ Giisu-no-tera

Prayer ground located south west of Nakagusuku castle. The ancestor of Masu Shimabukuro of Soeshi village is said to have enshrined the spirit stone and began the ritual here.





Historical Footsteps of Nakagusuku Cultural Properties

Many cultural properties are passed down from ancestors which can still be widely seen within the village.



This is the sacred place of prayer for a good harvest, prosperity for descendants and good health. Asato-no-tera enshrines a spirit stone, Bijuru.



2.Tsuha-no-tera

Tsuha-no-tera is located at the south of the Tsuha settlement. It is said that Kamadu Katsuren from Tsuha,

began to worship a spirit stone as an incarnation of a god, and built this shrine.





3. Tomari's Okuwadisa

(Village Designated Natural Monument)

This commemorative tree was planted about 200 years ago when a government official, who had been dispatched by the Shuri court, was reluctantly bidding farewell to the local people as he had been ordered to leave his post.



4.Monument Inscribed with Hana-no-Ishado Roem

思ゆらば里前 島とめていもり 島や中城 花の伊舎堂

"Please visit my birthplace, if you so desire. The place that is known as a beautiful castle town." In 1959, the Cultural Properties Protection Committee of the Ryukyu Kingdom Government erected this monument.

5. Monument of Repatriates' Landing



This monument was built to commemorate the evacuees, who had gone to mainland Japan and abroad, then safely came back to Okinawa by military ship after the Second World War.

Three pillars signify
"Anxiety" "Joy" and "Hope."



6. The Three Banyan Trees of Ishado Mae

(Village Designated Natural Monument)

It is said that the three couples that first moved to the hamlet of Ishado, planted them as a memorial. The trees were replanted after the war, and are currently the third generation.










7. War Memorial · Wave of Peace · Wind of Peace

About 5000 names of the war dead of Nakagusuku Village are inscribed to the memorial monument; Wave of Peace (Heiwa no nami). Wind of Peace (Heiwa no kaze) and the War Memorial are significant reminders of the horror of the war, and also to wish for lasting peace.





9.Yujidun

Prayer ground located in the Iju settlement. The ground is used for praying for good health,

longevity and to give thanks for good harvests.



10. Asato-no-muragaa

The public well of the village. It is said that the well never dried out even in

the drought.
